

IDEA: Categories of Disabilities -- Deafness

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) defines **Deafness** as:

a hearing impairment that is so severe that the child is impaired in processing linguistic information through hearing, with or without amplification, that adversely affects a child's educational performance.

What is Deafness?

Deafness is the inability to comprehend verbal language due to an inability to hear. The severity of a hearing impairment is ranked according to the additional intensity above a nominal threshold that a sound must be before being detected by an individual; it is measured in decibels of hearing loss; or dB HL. Typically hearing loss above 90 decibels is considered deafness. Hearing impairment may be ranked as the following:

- mild: between 20-40 dB HL
- moderate: between 41-54 dB HL
- moderately severe: between 55-70 dB HL
- severe: between 71-90 dB HL
- profound: 91 dB HL
- totally deaf: no hearing at all

What are the signs of Deafness?

Some signs that a child may not be hearing normally are:

- child does not respond consistently to sounds or to his or her own name;
- asks for things to be repeated or often says "huh?"
- turns the volume up loud on the TV and other devices;
- child is delayed in developing speech or has unclear speech.
